Both won the titles in the Spalding section.

Camozzi Pitches Double Header For Zinggs Cigar Store

It took big Gene Camozzi, the backbone of the San Mateo "Blues" to place the Zinggs Cigar Store team of Oakland in line for the Spalding League championship of California yesterday afternoon at Alameda. In a double-header with the Balboa Natives of San Francisco, the Zinggs had everything at stake, for the loss of one game would have meant the loss of the chance to play at Los Angeles for the state flag. Schlocker, a good chucker, started the first game for the Zinggs. In the fifth inning the score stood 5-5 and the promise of a Zingg victory was none too bright. It was at this point that Camozzi was sent in to pitch. And Gene certainly did his stuff, for he allowed but one hit in the remaining four frames and his teammates took heart and pounded 11 runs, winning the game 16 to 5. "Pat" Chester was on the receiving end for the Zinggs, Al Silva played short and "Lefty" Bertram was in center field. Sil played a crack game in the sho patch, handling 7 chances without a bobble.

The second game started almost immediately after the first, and Camozzi went to the hill for the Zinggs. Things were rather rough and the score hit 6-6 in the sixth frame. The Zingg manager was about to pull Camozzi, but changed his mind when the big San Mateoan begged to be allowed to continue. Gene tightened up and his teammates started to hit and the result was a 16-6 victory. Silva got four hits out of five time up in the first game and three out of four in the second. Bertram got seven hits in the two games, Camozzi five and Chester two.

Gene Camozzi copped his second straight game pitched good ball for the victims, but a double by Brett with three men on base spelled a loss for him. The Petaluma southpaw was found for only four hits.

The "swop" contingent, Ritchie, Camozzi and Mize, are having a race upon this week. It is a very tame affair, however, for the "dago red" floweth not in these parts.

Manager Ed Logan had his full strength in the lineup yesterday. Dandy Schutz, Sprud Spalding and Ray Garrigan, and it was one entirely different appearing ball club than the same aggregation that had to be patched the week before for they hammered the offerings of Hop Hampton, Lefty Jandula and Jimmy Hoffas to every and all corners of the lot. Al Silva was responsible for just exactly one dozen of the runs being banged across the platter.

That hefty southpaw, who will be on the mound again this season at San Mateo, Gene Camozzi, was never in any danger of losing either contest, as he pitched the last five frames of the first contest and the whole of the second and, as is usual with Gene, his control was perfect, which is something worth mentioning when speaking of pitchers.

The Balboa Natives took the first game of the series a week ago, but that was during the absence of the forementioned stellar performers, so with yesterday's two victories, the Zinggs now hold the bay district honors of the Spalding organization.

BUSH PLAYERS ALL SET FOR GREAT SERIES

Granat Brothers and Oakland All Stars Meet in Double-Header Today.

BUSH ball fans from far and wide and many of the regulars, too, will gather at the Oakland ball park this morning at 10 o'clock to witness the first game of the bay counties championship between the Granat Brothers, winners of the Seals Midwinter League championship, and the All Star team of the Oakland Midwinter League.

At the conclusion of the morning battle, the players will respond to be hurrying up call and make for Recreation Park, where at 2:30 they are billed to play their second game.

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As the teams have never met, there is little chance of hoping them out or forming a comparison. The Oakland fans believe that their club will have a walkover, while the San Francisco rooters are just as confident that the Granats will win in a walk.

The admission will be 30 cents in the bleachers and 50 cents in the grandstand.

The count on the series between these two teams now stands one victory apiece. Sunday's contest decides the second place honors of the winter circuit.

That there is not a great deal to choose in the two rivals, has been borne out in their last two contests. The Cops won the first game 4 to 1, and then the Granats turned around and handed the Coppers a 3 to 1 defeat last Sunday.

Ren Kelly, the Cops chucker, who came up from San Jose, where he is in training with the Seattle club, lost a hard luck contest, as he only allowed the jewelers' gang three bingles; in fact, Kelly has only lost two games in the Winter League, both of which were, accidentally, three-hit contests.

Gene Camozzi, the party twirler for the Granats, does not have to hide his face on account of his pitching in this year's winter loop; he held the Cops to five hits Sunday. Besides holding the strike-out record of the league, Gene has an average of less than two runs and four hits per game. So one may see that the pitching that will be seen at Recreation Park Sunday will be of the highest quality; in fact, there cannot be found any better in San Francisco semi-pro ball.

The depoters and the wise ones who had pinned all their faith on the Cops have now come to the conclusion that it is a toss-up.
