CAMOZZI PUZZLES CHAMPION BLOOMERS

But For Freak Hop, Gene Would Probably Have Blanked Foe—Zahniser Routed.

It wouldn't be a half bad idea for those busy major league scouts to ask for a price on Gene Camozzi as well as on Jimmy Keenan, from my way of thinking.
Gene, let it be known, turned back the champion Bloomers in yesterday's single combat, 5 to 2. But for a freak hop of an ordinary single over Manager Daringer's dome in right, it is probable the southpaw would have daubed a coat of white on Dunn's pennant chasers as well as blow put over all the tallies the foe could gather.
All told, Camozzi allowed eight hits, all in the first four innings. In the last five he was invincible. His lone pass came in the ninth between outs. Three stickers were set down on strikes by the left-hander. That's some sweet slabbing, now isn't it?

Gene Busts One.
But that isn't all the knob artist accomplished. With three on in the second stanza he poked one to left, scoring two. After that, however, he let his mates do the clouting, and they did to a queen's taste.
With the Evans coming strong and within striking distance of first place, Joe Dunn started Zahniser against Our Boys, but the leading three-1 run for the job. In the four rounds he lasted the locals, registered their five runs.
Zahniser's pass to Joe Meyer started the locals off in the second inning as Krehmeyer followed with a sacrifice and Collins got in the way of a wild heave, taking first with a paining arm. Daringer walked, loading 'em up. It was at this point that Camozzi busted one to left, Meyer and Collins counting.

Dee's second of three doubles pried open the victors' half of the third. "Sherry" stole third and rook some when Tom Casey slammed a two-bagger to the right field fence.

Both Score in Fourth.
Both clubs scored two in the fourth. Snyder and Sykes singled. Lenahan popped out to Dee. Jantzen hit to right and just as the boss was set to grab it for a head to the plate, the pill bounded high over his head, the two "S's" scouting across. The local discard raced to third on the duke triple, but expired there.

In the locals' half, Collins spanked one to left and Camozzi was safe on Lenahan's hobble after Daringer had skied out O'Berla, followed with a single as did Dee. Collins going in on the last safety. Johnson then smote a long sacrifice fly to Thompson. Camozzi prancing over after the catch. Al Maderias was one of the heroes. He slapped a terrific two-base hit to left field, scoring Makin with the tying run. Carl Johnson was another when he doubled to the same garden in the last half of the ninth when there were two down, but it is reasonable to give Genial Gene Camozzi the crown of laurel for his screaming liner to right center that brought Johnson over the rubber with the winning run.

In addition to his stick work, no little praise is due Gene for the manner in which he bore down on the enemy after he took up his station on the mound in the fourth inning. Simoni started the twirling but an error and a home run in the opening frame seemed to get a little the best of him and he was in the box. It as an off day for Guido but he has them so rarely they hardly count. The Commoners hit him in every inning he pitched and scored in all but one of them. Genial Gene had another one of those days when he was practically invincible and allowed but two hits during the half of the game he was on the high spot.

Derby Candidates May Work Out at Ball Park Sunday

As an additional attraction at the ball park tomorrow afternoon, Carlos "Three and Two-Tenths" Brown, Tom Casey and Gene Camozzi, the trio who will compete in the famous Brown Derby may put on a workout for the baseball fans. Then again they may not. It is something like that just-around-the-corner thing, problematical.

Casey is just back from a training grind up in Calaveras and his trainers say he clicked off the Brown Derby distance so fast in several workouts that he burned the hands off the clocker's stop watch trying to catch his time. Brown has worn a path an inch deep at the track in Casey's Smoke Shop prepping for the big derby. Gene Camozzi's workouts have all been in secret, but the fact that he is now a strong favorite at 1-4 indicates the wise boys are all going for Camozzi.

Blues to Open Current Sked April Fourth

Gene Camozzi, veteran pitcher of the San Mateo Blues, was today chosen as the 1937 manager of the San Mateo team.

Camozzi, who has been with the team since 1915, and has been an active twirler for the last 15 years, was chosen by Directors Seth Cohn and Chester Newbert. Camozzi, besides being the manager of the Blues, will now step in as one of the directors, also, filling the shoes of the retiring manager, Justin Fitzgerald, in both jobs.

The Blues will not open their season until April, according to Newbert, when they will have four home games to be played on the San Mateo city park. So far scheduled for the first month of play are the Daly City-Tanforan nine and the Horseshoe Tavern of San Francisco. Two other games will be chosen to fill out the month's program.

Though no game has been definitely scheduled for March 28, the San Mateo nine may face a pick-up San Mateo affair at the city park, in order to get a taste of the spheroid in action.

Since there will be no state league this year, the Blues will schedule all their games through the Spaulding's Sport Shop in San Francisco, through Al Earle, president of the now defunct State league.
A committee, headed by Mayor Simmen of San Mateo, and consisting of Seth Cohn and Joe Darcy, will start work next week to round up funds for the carrying on of the Blues this year.
