

BASEBALL SEASON TO CLOSE HERE SUNDAY

The San Mateo Blues will end their 1924 baseball season on Sunday afternoon when they meet the fast Petaluma team on the San Mateo grounds at 2:30 o'clock. GRANAT NINE TO MEET EAST BAY CHAMPS

Oakland Stars and Midwinter League Winners Start Five-Game Series Sunday.

W HAT promises to be the most thrilling bush ball series staged in California since the historic "Exam-iner" tournament of 1897 will start next Sunday morning at the Oakland Coast League park. The opposing clubs will be the Granat Brothers winners of the Seals Midwinter League flag, and an all-star team composed of the pick of the transbay league.

According to the terms of agreement signed last night, the series will consist of five games. One game will be played in Oakland next Sunday morning and one the following Sunday morning. The second and fourth games will be played at Recreation Park next Sunday afternoon and the following Sunday afternoon.

If a fifth game is necessary it will be played on February 23 and the managers of the rival teams will toss a coin for the selection of the battle field.

An admission fee of 30 cents will be charged for bleacher seats and 50 cents for grandstand seats. The spoils will be divided after each game, the winners taking 60 and the losers 40 per cent.

Calders, one of the pitching sensations of the Oakland league, will be on the mound for the transbay club next Sunday morning and will be opposed by "Lefty" Ludolph.

Herbert McQuaid, the nineteen-year-old giant who goes to the Seals, has been selected to do the pitching and opposed to him will be Gene Camozzi, stocky southpaw, who last Sunday won the championship of the Midwinter League for the Granats by getting away with a double header.
