

# Triple Play Feature Of Final Contest of Year in Pro League

Walter Mails Pitches Last Game for Kittens and Figures in  
1918 Great Play—Seattle Wins First and  
Drops the Last One.

The large crowd which made their final trip of the P. C. I. season out to Tainter Valley to see the league leaders do their farewell skit Sunday saw a couple of exciting struggles, in which Seattle won one and lost the other by scores of 4 to 3 and 5 to 1, respectively.

The Aberdeen Kittens staged the first triple play ever made in the park. It happened in the second game. So, with Walter Mails pitcher for Egan's crew, a lot of swell catches dashed up and a few other features thrown in, it was a pretty good ending to a bum season.

### A Great Play.

The triple play was what the fans went home talking about. When Chatty Walter strode out to the box the fans were surprised, as foxy Dick Egan had told them that the Ames' left-hander was going to work. Le Bourveau, first up, greeted Mails with a ripping single over second. Smale was hit by a pitched ball. And then it happened. Jimmy Hamilton, who was playing in place of Capt. Murphy, drove a hard hit ball over first. Both Smale and Le Bourveau started with the crack of the bat, but Dobbs reached up and hooked the pill with his glove hand. Mails played his position well by tearing over and covering first, doubling Smale, and then shooting to Morse at second for the third out. It was one of the prettiest plays ever seen here.

After getting out of this hole, Mails settled down and let the Giants down with three safe hits. He struck out eight and was invincible in the pinches. Meanwhile the Kittens got to Cy Young, who won the first game, and drove in five tallies. Mails' wildness gave the locals several chances to get some runs, but Mails tightened at the crucial moments and all headed off all tallies but one.

### Young Wins Another.

In the first game Young finished a most successful season by defeating the visitors in a close, exciting affair. Seattle won it in the final frame. The score was tied up to the ninth, the locals getting three in the third and Aberdeen coming back with a trio of markers in the sixth. In the ninth Le Bourveau, first up, singled. Smale promptly followed suit, while Jimmy Hamilton smacked another one safe and brought Le Bourveau over with the winning score.

Seattle got their only run off Mails in the fifth. Leathers walked, went to third when Mails threw wild to first in effort to catch him off the bag, and came home on Le Bourveau's solid poke to center. "Meber" was the only man who could hit Mails, but he got two pretty singles off the Ames hurler.

Three in the fifth and two more in the seventh, the last two the result of Bogart's three-bagger, were the sum and total of the Kittens' runs. Dick Egan got into another row with the Timp and was banished, although he threatened to pull his club off the field.

### Some Pretty Catch.

Some nice catches in the outfield brightened the struggle. McMorrain, the substitute left fielder, handled his job like a star. Jerry Altschul pulled a couple of swell catches in center for Aberdeen, while Roland contributed another in left. Hamilton's work at third was flashy at times, while Smale and Morse both played well.

Mickey Shader, who managed the famous 1928 San Francisco Stock Exchange team that won the State league championship that year from the San Mateo Blues will bring a team of all-star rookies to San Mateo Sunday to play Wally Estes' Texaco team. Estes, realizing the strength of the visitors has retained Ted Pillette of the Missions to oppose Stutz, San Francisco Seal hurler, who will do mound duty for Shader's team. Estes indicated last night that he was also going to make an effort to secure Gene Camozzi to work in Sunday's game. Estes feels that in case Pillette is not as good as he was last Sunday when he struck out thirteen batters he may need reinforcements, and he considers Camozzi the best relief pitcher in bush league baseball.

### Good Team Coming

Shader is bringing Walter Schulken's team here. Schulken is a big businessman and leading sportsman of the east bay district. At one time Walter was one of the best heavyweight boxers in the four round game. Suddenly he realized the futility of boxing as a business, deserted the game, entered business and has made a great success of it.

Schulken has always maintained his interest in sports. He dropped boxing for baseball, and has one of the best semi-pro teams in California.

### DeVota Is Good

Schulken, who will do the catching for the visiting Schulken team is one of the best prospects in semi-pro circles. He's likely to be with some Coast league team before the conclusion of this season. Stutz, who is booked to start the game in the box for the visitors Sunday is a regular in the San Francisco Seals line-up. He and Pillette, who is to pitch for the Texaco team, have opposed each other in Coast league engagements and have put on stirring battles.

### Dixie Star in Line

Hammock, who will be seen at shortstop for the visitors, played last season with the Tyler, Texas team in the Dixie league. He's a fast and snappy player, and should put on a good exhibition here. Phillips and Thomas, two of the outfielders, have seen regular league service and they're both booked for professional baseball next year.

Donato, Stewart and Fernandez,

infielders, are the pick of the semi-pros around San Francisco, and they're the sort of players who always put a lot of pep and scrap in a game.

Estes wants to win this game more than any game he has played this season. He realizes that if he can beat Shader's team it will increase his prestige.

### Camozzi to Pitch

If Estes can get Camozzi to help him in this game his chances for winning it will be increased for Camozzi is not only a good pitcher, but he's a great hitter and good coacher. Gene is also a very popular ball player and his presence in a Texaco uniform would help to swell the crowd.

Estes has some of his players doing road work to be in shape for the big game. He figures that his boys will have to be at their top form to beat a team like Schulken's, and he's pointing them for this battle the same as a coach points a football team for an important battle.

## WORLD'S SERIES OPENS SUNDAY FOR BUSH STARS

Local and Oakland Teams Play Double-Header Tomorrow—Championship of State at Stake.



IVALING in interest the renowned world's series every fall between the permanent-winning teams of the American and National leagues—that is, so far as San Francisco and Oakland are concerned—the first game of the semi-pro world's series of northern California will be played tomorrow morning at Oakland. However, those who have seen the teams of both leagues play are willing to wager their shoes on the Oakland club. They assert that the Oakland boys have more ability in every department of the game than the local phenoms.
