

San Mateo Captures State League Title 1929

DEFEATING the San Jose Bees, 7 to 6, yesterday, the San Mateo Blues won the championship of the California State League.

As the Blues also captured the title in the first half, they are the winners of the \$1,000 purse that goes with the pennant.

Yesterday's contest was played before the largest crowd that ever jammed the Floral City diamond. The overflow called for ground rules.

Camozzi started for the winners and pitched good ball, but he hit a wild streak and had to be replaced by Jimmy Vierra in the fifth inning. The latter turned a nice performance, his best work being done in the pinches.

Jack Kavanaugh, the Garden City southpaw, who opens on the mound for the losers, was stringy with base hits but far too generous with walks and, as a result, had to be replaced. Schnarr succeeded to the mound and was nice for a double that scored three tallies which decided the issue.

The Blues started the scoring in the second frame with a two-run rally, and from that point on they kept ahead of their opponents, maintaining a one run margin most of the way.

Danny Collins and George Makin supplied the power in the Blues' offense, each driving in three scores. Curly Gardner and Carl Johnson aided in the Floral City

victory by accounting for five of the seven tallies registered.

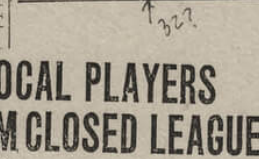
WELL-KNOWN LOCAL PLAYERS HOME FROM CLOSED LEAGUES

Camozzi won 10 games and lost eight with Aberdeen, wildness being his only fault.
