The Padres took a one-run lead in the opening inning on singles by Valla, Skillicorn and Paynter. Then Camozzi tightened up and no more runs were tallied by the visitors until the fifth frame when a single by Choiser and doubles by Valla and Skillicorn gave them another pair of runs.

The Blues came back with three runs on a walk, a double, an error and two singles. Rags no got the walk and went to second on Viani's sacrifice, scoring on Anti's double. Oliver was safe when Kirby made a bad toss to first; Richards singled and scored on Marriott's long single to right.

The Padres gave the Blues a terrific scare in the last inning, forcing Genial Gene to push himself off the mound and send in Speed Luque to stop the apparent disaster.

Valla had popped up to Marriott and Skillicorn slapped a double in the general direction of the score board; Nielsen tripled to right, scoring Skillicorn and then scored a run ahead of Paynter who slapped one onto the highway.

It was at this point that Camozzi yanked himself out of the box and sent Luque in. "Speed" did not start so well as he walked the first man to face him, but he struck out the second man and assisted in putting the third one out at first, ending the game.

As there will be no playoff necessary to decide the championship of the first half the second half will start next Sunday. No games will be played July 3, all teams taking a rest over the three-day holiday. The San Francisco Verdis will be the Blues' opponents on the opening date of the second half.
