Fitzmen Blast Cunningham From Mound in First Inning; Conquer San Jose Bees, 12-3

Two home runs in the first inning—seven runs altogether. That was the way the San Mateo Blues started to a decisive 12-3 triumph over the San Jose Bees yesterday afternoon at Sodalit Park, San Jose. The victory, coupled with the Watsonville defeat of Santa Cruz placed the Blues in possession of undisputed leadership in the second half of the state league pennant race.

The first inning was a weary story for San Jose. Cunningham started by walking the first three men. Then Burns hit a easy one to Lyons, the San Jose shortstop, who muffed it, Montague coming home and Burns reaching first safely to load the bases.

McIntyre's Catch Then Earl Maggart Jr. caught one of Cunningham's pitches for a home run. Specs Shea was rushed in but not being sufficient, warmed up walked the first man. Then came Billy Prout who banged out another homer, and when he crossed the plate it was the seventh run.

From then on it was easy sailing. Stan Phillips was hit often, but kept them scattered. His team mates gave him excellent support in the field.

Stan began to falter in the fifth, and was retired after a brilliant saving catch by McIntyre out in left field. A San Jose batter hit a terrific one far into left field which looked good for at least a triple. McIntyre raced far back and with a leap against the boards, speared it one-handed. It was the outstanding play of the game.
