

INDIANS LOSE TO CUB YANS

Spokane Victory Snatched Away by Ninth Inning Double

STOCKTON, March 11.—A ninth inning double play prevented Nick Williams' Spokane Indians from putting one over on the Chicago club Yansigans here this morning. The boys from the Windy City annexed the long end of the 5-4 score. The Spokane squad arrived here last evening for spring training, and this morning's brush with the Cubs was their first game of the season. They led until the fourth inning, when the Cubs tied the score. In the sixth inning they landed on young Mr. Bloomfield of Antioch for three hits—a triple by Hintz, a single by Smith and a double by Benton—netting two runs and placing them in the lead.

Tom Seaton and Pete Standridge, divided pitching honors for the Cubs. Camozzi relieved Bloomfield after the sixth.

The Cubs returned to Sacramento to fill a date with the Seals this afternoon while the Indians went to Modesto to meet the Reds.

The Grant Brothers went on a batting rampage in the sixth inning when they converted two bingles into one run. Things also looked dark for Keating in the seventh inning when he was found for two bingles, but his curves baffled Llewellyn and Camozzi.

The Hatters scored the final tally in the ninth inning when Dehany, who had been playing a brilliant game, was walked and advanced to second on a fielder's choice. He scored when McKnew uncorked the ball to center, a triple, the longest hit of the day. In their half the Grant Brothers succeeded in getting one man on but could not bring him around.

Johnny Kerr and Willie Rose, third baseman and shortstop respectively for the Hatters, played bang-up ball. A crowd estimated at 5000 watched the tussle.
