lars of his 1940 San Mateo club and comes up with the announcement that the local team he fields tomorrow night will include the best offered during the regular season.

Kelly is definitely slated to start, according to Camozzi, with Bob Larson, hero of the last two San Mateo games, probably finishing the game.

The Seals will probably start Sam Gibson, the ageless mound artist who recently dropped a tilt to the Franco Markets of Santa Clara. If not Gibson, then Ed Stutz will take the mound, with Win Ballou held for reserve action.

Only one change will be found in San Mateo's infield. Eddie Underwood, brilliant young shortstop, who learned his baseball at San Mateo High school, will hold down that spot.

Hal Stoeven will be at first base, Carl Severs at second, and Dutch Anderson at third base.

In the outfield will be Roy Wetmore, left; Logan Hooper, center; and Buzzy Fitzgerald, right.

This will be the first of two post-season games for the Blues. They will meet Bob Gibson's all-stars here next Tuesday night.
