Genial Gene Camozzi, Curley Garner and Swede Peterson were the only three to benefit. All others took a drop.

Genial Gene now leads the team in batting with a very healthy .556 and says he has only just started.

Camozzi's run on Freck Owen's hit won the game, but Curley Gardner's single in the eighth scoring Anti and Johnson was the one that tied it up.

Lister walked a half dozen of the Blues but he only allowed them seven hits, Genial Gene being the only one to get two slaps at him, and was the King of Swat for the day.

Bertram leads the pack in walks for the first four games of the league season, having 7 to his credit. Johnson is right behind him with 6, followed by Anti with 3. Every other man on the team, with the exception of Maderus has walked at least once.

Camozzi and Gardner are the only two who have not been breezed back to the bench this season.

Next Sunday the Stockton Barons make their debut on the San Mateo field, but they needn't look for the same kind of baseball the Blues put on last Sabbath.

Some one remarked to Camozzi the other day that it looked as though he was "coming back." "H—!" indignantly disclaimed the southpaw, "I haven't been anywhere."

Camozzi's left arm has won countless games and appears to be just as strong now at it was when he first crashed into sandlot fame. The San Leandro hurler is one of the best semi-pro hurlers in this section of the State.

Camozzi had Tidell ten feet off the bag in the first inning, but Robinson miscued Gene's throw and was charged with an error on the play.

The All-Stars broke Camozzi's run of scoreless innings pitched in the first inning, when they tallied once. In the two preceding games Camozzi pitched scoreless baseball for the locals, beating both the Olympic Club team and Broadway Store team each 3 to 0.

Poor "old" Gene Camozzi. It's too darn bad he is also washed up and ready for the bone pile. He has been playing ball long enough to be a veteran, but is still going after it like a 2-year-old.
