

STARS BADLY FOGGED WITH CAMOZZI GAS

S. M. Pitcher Throws Smoke Screen Over Spaldings—Beats Them 9 To 2.

Spalding's All-Stars didn't twinkle very brightly here yesterday afternoon, the smoke screen of Gene Camozzi dimming them, and San Mateo walked off with the game, score 9 to 2. Fitzgerald's smart youths outthrew, outhoofed, outthought and outplayed them, and that sort of thing spells disaster for any ball club.

In the opening inning it looked as though it was going to be a hard fought battle when the visitors scored a tally on Garrigan's triple and Tidell's single, but the fireworks ended there.

Feeley Very Wild
Chief Feeley, who is ordinarily a good pitcher, didn't seem to have his range finder with him and he was wild and ineffective, especially in the opening stanza, when San Mateo scored four runs and put the game on ice. Feeley hit two batsmen and walked one in the opening inning, filling the bases with only one down. "Spud" Maloney emptied the paths for the locals when he blazed a double down the center field lane, scoring Bertram, Stoffel and Silva. Caesar Manelli got the range on one of Feeley's fast ones and shot it down the bowling alley in center for a double, scoring Maloney.

San Mateo Scores
Bertram walked, Stoffel's sacrifice and singles by Silva and Maloney netted the Fitzgerald crew another brace of tallies in the second frame. Silva's single, Maloney's sacrifice and a single by Robinson tallied another for San Mateo in the fifth.

Tidell's single in the sixth followed by Suhr's infield out and a blazing double by Alshutt gave the All-Stars their second and final run of the game in the sixth inning.

After Casey rapped out a stinging single in the sixth he was forced at second by Camozzi. Bertram fanned, but Stoffel came through with a single to left which Alshutt fumbled, allowing the one and only "Home Run" Gene Camozzi to score.

Silva opened the seventh for the locals by reaching first base on Garrigan's fumble. He took second on a wild pitch. Caesar Manelli tore a ton of dirt off the third base path with his scorching single to left field, scoring Silva with the Blues' ninth and final run of the game.

MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 11, 1933 CAMOZZI HERO OF SAN MATEO WIN OVER BEES

Genial Gene Pitches Great Ball After Lister Driven From Mound in First

Gene Camozzi, who faded out of the picture as a member of the Blues' pitching staff early in the season following an illness, today was hailed as the hero of the San Mateans' 13-4 victory over the Bees in their State league title series opener at San Jose yesterday.

Taking over the hurling duties in the first inning after the Bees had driven Lister from the box, Camozzi pitched great ball to hold the Bees to three hits and allowed only one run.

The Blues gave Camozzi strong support, nicking Sheo and Alviso for thirteen hits, eleven of which were banged out in two big innings, the second and seventh.

BEES FLOUNDER
The Bees, on the other hand, floundered behind a tottering Spec Shea who took himself out of the game in the seventh. Alviso went to the mound and held the Blues to two hits.

Things started badly for the Blues in the first frame when the Bees loaded the bags. Dondero doubled to drive in two runs and Amaral doubled with two away to score Dondero. At this point Camozzi relieved Lister, proceeded to intentionally walk Panizzi, again filling the bases and then got Shea on a fly ball to Benjamin.

The Blues came back to score four runs in the second.

Maggart, Switzer, Prout, O'Connell and Camozzi hit in succession for the four runs, Montague finally hitting into a double play and Benjamin whiffing to stop the rally.

In the third inning, Keane's single and Burns' double accounted for two more runs, Burns scoring on Switzer's infield out.

FANAZZI HITS HOMER
The Bees added their other run in the fourth when Panazzi homed to deep left field.

The seventh was a big canto for the Blues who scored six runs on five hits. Camozzi and Benjamin walked with Montague's double sandwiched in filled the bags. Genau drove them all in with a single. Burns flew out to Rollendetti but Keane scored on the catch. Moggart doubled, Switzer homed to left field and Shea retired. Alviso went in, Prout singled but O'Connell was nipped on a fielder's choice to retire the side.

The Blues scored their final run in the ninth when Keane doubled and tallied on Maggart's long fly to Rollendetti.

The second game of the series will be played at San Mateo next Sunday and the site of the third game, if this is necessary will be decided by a flip of the coin.

VETERAN SOUTHPAW IN FINE FORM, HOLDS BEES TO THREE SAFE BLOWS

Darwin once said that evolution made ball players out of monkeys—and most of the world agreed.

But even Darwin would have a hard time convincing the public that you could make monkeys out of ball players—but that is exactly what a veteran southpaw pitcher by the name of Gene "King" Camozzi did to the much vaunted San Jose Bees at Sodality park in San Jose yesterday afternoon before a record crowd of Garden City fans. San Mateo won the game, of course, and the score was 13 to 4, giving the Fitzmen the first lap in the play-off for the State league championship.

"King" Camozzi did everything to the extolled sluggers of the San Jose cast but he a string around their necks, chain them to a music box, and send them out to beg for pennies.

Camozzi didn't feed the San Jose batsmen peanuts to keep them quiet, but he dished up a fast ball and a snappy jug-handle hook that sent them home with three hits during the eight and one-third innings that he was on public view.

Young Walter Lister started to hurl for the Fitzmen, but he lasted just two thirds of one inning, and in that brief period the Bees gathered three runs off Walt's sliders on a base on balls, a pair of singles, and a brace of doubles. Lister didn't seem to have even halitosis, and Fitzgerald yanked him to prevent him being maimed.

With two away in the hop-off-inning, three runs across the pan, and the outlook gloomy for San Mateo, Fitzgerald waved Lister out of the pitcher's box and injected "King" Camozzi into the picture. Camozzi walked Panizzi, the first man he pitched to, and forced Shea to pop up to Benjamin, ending a disastrous inning for San Mateo.

San Mateo got a pair of runners on the paths in the opening inning, but Shea fanned Keane and Burns, and Montague was forced at second on Benjamin's easy tap.

Fitz' Gunners Get Range
In the second inning the Fitzgerald gunners got the range on "Spec" Shea's delivery, and they unleashed a drumfire attack that for savagery and ferocity would have pleased a band of head hunters.

They knocked everything that Shea had all around the sand dunes that make up Sodality park, and it looked as though they'd knock Shea loose from his "spees" but for a fast double play. Maggart, Switzer, and Prout blazed singles to the outfield in this spasm, O'Connor doubled and Camozzi singled, and when the smoke from the blazing bats of San Mateo cleared away, four Fitzgerald runners had crossed the plate, putting them out in front by a one-run margin.

San Mateo picked up another pair of runs in their half of the third on Keane's single, Burns' half homer, Maggart's long fly to Amaral, and Switzer's infield tap.

The Bees got their fourth and last run in their half of the fourth, when Panizzi blasted out a four-ply clout off Camozzi's delivery.

After that circuit clout by Pietro Mascagni Panizzi in the fourth inning, "King" Camozzi buckled down to business, and he was harder to touch for a hit than a pawn-broker with St. Vitus dance is to touch for a gold tooth. For the last five innings of the bout, Camozzi blanked the Bees and allowed them just one hit during that period, a poky single by Rolandetti in the seventh inning.

A murderous assault in the seventh inning by the Fitzgerald Fusileers made a debacle out of the game. With O'Connell down on a pop foul fly which Lindner reached over the rail back of first base and caught for an out, Camozzi walked and was shot along to third on Montague's slashing double to right field. Benjamin drew four wide ones for a stroll. Then Jackie Keane almost tore the cover off the ball with a savage half homer to center, scoring Montague and Benjamin. Keane went to third on the wide leg by Bliethen, throw-in, a "Lefty" an error. Burns raised a high fly to Rolandetti, on which Keane scored. Maggart dou-

bled to center and Switzer unleashed a circuit drive to left field, scoring Maggart ahead of himself. Prout smashed out his second single of the game. O'Connell up in the second time in the seventh inning, forced Prout at second. Lyons to Panizzi. The Blues assembled six runs in this stupendous inning on three doubles, a home run, a single, and a long fly.

Just to make it unlucky for the Bees, the Fitzmen scored their thirteenth run, also their thirteenth hit, in the ninth inning, on Keane's second double of the day. Burns' tap to the pitcher, and Maggart's long fly to Amaral.
