CAMOZZI'S COMEBACK THRILLS FANS AS SAN MATEO WINS TITLE, 9-4

The pulsating bats of Justin Fitzgerald's San Mateo Blues beat a tattoo of doom, while the monotonous zooming of a five ounce baseball projected through the air from the stalwart left arm of Gene Camozzi dirged a knell of death to the championship aspirations of San Jose's Bees, while an enchanted audience of several thousand fans sat entranced through the baseball drama at city park yesterday, which resulted in a 9 to 4 victory for San Mateo's Blues, bringing the 1933 California State league championship to this city. It was the second successive victory of the Fitzmen over the Bees, and the second time that ancient warrior "King" Camozzi hurled the foe into the dust of defeat in the three game play-off for the baseball gonfalon of the Al Erle loop.

San Mateo won the first game of the series at San Jose, 13 to 4, and repeated the initial victory with the clincher yesterday in almost as one-sided a manner. To "King" Camozzi, Tom Casey's apt pupil, goes much of the credit for the Blues' double victory over the Bees. This ancient mariner of the baseball diamond, alleged to be "all through," "washed up," and rubbed out of the picture, made such a sensational comeback in the title tilt that today he is acclaimed the hero of the series and the savior of the championship for San Mateo.

Faultless Fielding
The Fitzmen played faultless baseball yesterday. They bombarded the best offerings of Alvise to all parts of the lot, making seven hits for a total of twenty-five bases. The official scorer credited Bill Prout with an error, but he was the only one in the ball park that would have given Prout an error on the play. That was the only error in yesterday's game. This writer absolves Prout of the said error and passes it on to the official scorer, who was really the one who erred. The play on which Prout was charged with an error occurred in the third inning. Lefty Blethen smashed one at Prout, which took Bill off his feet. Prout, after going down, arose quickly and dived at first base. He missed making the "out" on Blethen by inches. Not one first baseman in ten would have gotten the ball in the first instance, let alone trying to make a play on it after he got it. Blethen should have been given a hit on the play. But an official scorer is an official scorer, and the error stands in the official score.

Bees Take Early Lead
The San Jose boys were off to a one-run lead in the hop-off inning when a single by Blethen, Rolandetti's sacrifice hit, and Dondero's two-bagger down the left field lane netted them one run.

The victors' lead was as short-lived as peace in Cuba, as the Fitzmen scoring five runs in their half of the opening inning. Montague, first San Mateo batsman up, was walked, and pranced to third on Benjamin's half-homer. Keane singled, sending Benjamin to third. Burns was out, Alvise to Lindner. Maggart blasted a single to right field, scoring Keane, and McIntyre tripled, scoring Maggart. McIntyre crossed the plate on Prout's blazing double. O'Connell flew to Blethen, and Camozzi ended the big inning on an easy grounder to Pete Fanizzi. Five runs, five hits, no errors.

Camozzi Bears Down
Camozzi bore down on the Bees after the opening inning, and goose-egged them, for the next six innings, allowing them only two hits during this period.

The Blues went scoreless in the second, third, and fourth innings, but they broke through for a run in the fifth inning on singles by Montague, Keane, and Maggart.

San Mateo added another tally in the sixth on O'Connell's single through short and Camozzi's double to left field. Burns' double and a pair of infield out: gave San Mateo one more run in the seventh.
