## Genial Gene Hurls Shutout In Final Game

The San Mateo Blues brought down the curtain on their 1932 season yesterday with an impressive 6 to 0 victory over the Melrose Merchants, labeled as champions of Alameda county. Manager M. J. Burke announced today that the Blues had hung up their spikes for the year, and that no more exhibition games would be scheduled.

The Blues defeated the much-touted Merchants without half trying, although Elliott, the elongated pitcher for the opposition, held San Mateo scoreless for five innings, striking out 7. Elliott was as wild as a hare at times, walking six of the Blues, but he had them guessing the majority of the time.

Camozzi Hurls Game  
Camozzi went the full nine innings for the Blues and never turned a hair during the entire performance.

The Blues scored all their runs in the sixth and seventh innings. In the sixth Jackie Keane who has proved himself to be the real heavy hitter of the Blues, slapped out a two bagger, the only hit that went for an extra base during the game. He went to third after a high fly from Burns had been pulled down by the centerfielder. Olsen took one of the half dozen walks donated by Elliott and Keane scored on O'Connell's fly that was nabbed by the left fielder.

Viani Starts Rally  
In the seventh the Blues put the game away for all time when they made five runs on as many hits and an error.

Ray Viani started the accumulation of runs with a single to left and then Eddie Antl shot one to short that was too hot to be handled without a pair of mits.

Oliver slapped an easy bouncer toward third but Loranzana evidently didn't like the looks of it and started to kick it around the field after he had missed it. That filled the bases. Keane slid into position at the plate and almost immediately slid a single to center, scoring Viani and Antl.

Burns tried hard enough but his fly was pulled down by the shortstop and then as Keane swiped second Olsen singled to left, scoring Oliver and Keane. Jimmy O'Connell singled through second and Olsen scored the last run of the game.

Veloso, catcher for the Melrose tribe was the star batsman of the afternoon, getting three for four, followed by Viani and Olsen, each collecting two for three attempts.

Long Throw Feature  
Genial Gene Camozzi was only twice officially at bat and on both of those occasions had the misfortune to hit into double plays. The other two times he was at the plate he was granted free transportation.

Probably the feature play of the game was the throw-in of Oliver from deep center to the plate, in the second inning. Loranzana walked and went to second on a sacrifice by Reis; Veloso singled to center and when Loranzana attempted to complete the circuit on the hit he found the ball waiting for him in Jimmy O'Connell's hand, after a perfect throw-in.
